Preparedness Plan Introduction

Governor Whitmer's Executive Order 2020-142 "provides a structure to support all schools in Michigan as they plan for a return of pre-K-12 education in the fall. Under the order, school districts must adopt a COVID-19 Preparedness and Response Plan laying out how they will cope with the disease across the various phases of the Michigan Safe Start Plan. In turn, the accompanying Michigan Return to School Roadmap offers a guide to the types of safety protocols appropriate during each phase. There's no one-size-fits-all solution: What works in Lansing may not work in Sault Sainte Marie. Districts will retain the flexibility to tailor their instruction to their particular needs and to the disease conditions present in their regions." (EO-2020-142)

Each district (public, public school academy (PSA), nonpublic, and intermediate school district (ISD) that educates pre-K-12 students) shall submit a single completed Assurance Document and Preparedness Plan to its Board in time for approval by August 15 or seven days before the first day of school, whichever comes first. This template, when completed, serves as a single Assurance Document and Preparedness Plan.

The Preparedness Plan will be collected by the Intermediate School District for public school districts, the authorizing body for public school academies, or the chief/designated school administrator for nonpublic schools for transmission to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and State Treasurer by August 17, 2020. Additionally, this Preparedness Plan must be posted on the district's/PSA's, or nonpublic school's public website home page no later than August 17, 2020. A single application should be filed by the district rather than multiple applications for individual schools within a district.

Preparedness Plan Assurances

The District agrees to meet all of the following requirements of Executive Order 2020-142

- The District assures that when it provides in-person instruction to its students without disabilities, the district must also provide in-person instruction to its students with disabilities, consistent with their individualized education programs (IEPs).
- ✓ The District assures that when schools are closed to in-person instruction, districts must strive in good faith and to the extent practicable, based upon available resources, technology, training, and curriculum, as well as the circumstances presented by COVID-19, to provide equal access to any alternative modes of instruction to students with disabilities from birth through age 26. (b) Food-service workers preparing food for distribution to students or their families. (c) Licensed child-care providers and the families that they serve, if providers follow all emergency protocols identified by the state.
- ✓ The District assures that during Phase 1, 2, or 3 of the Michigan Safe Start Plan it will suspend athletics, after-school activities, inter-school activities, and busing.
- ✓ The District assures that during Phase 1, 2, or 3 of the Michigan Safe Start Plan it will provide for the continued pay of school employees while redeploying staff to provide meaningful work in the context of the Preparedness Plan, subject to any applicable requirements of a collective bargaining agreement.
- ✓ The District assures that in Phases 1, 2, or 3 of the *Michigan Safe Start Plan* it will provide for the continuation of food distribution to eligible students.

<u>Counseling and social emotional support for Phase 1-3 during online instruction:</u> During this crisis, the school counseling department will continue maintaining the high quality scope of service that we offer during the school year. In order to help us continue to reach and serve students, families, and staff, counselors will offer virtual office hours and will also regularly send surveys out to families and students. Counselors network with teaching staff to determine observed student needs, and regularly monitor several Google referral forms for mental health referrals, and network students and families with available outside services and resources. WEOC will continue to offer one on one, small group, and research informed mental health instructional services for WEOC students in need. It is our hope that we will be able to offer this same level of support that we offer in person so that there is some certainty in these uncertain times.

In Phase 4 of the Michigan Safe Start Plan, WEOC programs will ensure access to academic, instructional and social emotional support for all students through the following remote learning approaches that build on our original continuity of learning plans. We will also coordinate scheduled face to face meetings both on campus, by appointment off campus with some students, or offer one day per week of in person learning for designated students in need (ex. mental health, special needs, housing insecure, etc).

Face coverings during scheduled face to face instruction and counseling for Phase 4: All staff and students (WEOC has students in grades 6-12) will be required to wear a face covering, except during meals and unless face coverings cannot be medically tolerated, at all times in the school, during school activities, and on any school supplied transport.

2. Hygiene

Please describe how you will implement the **requirements** for hygiene protocols from the *Return to School Roadmap* (p. 22-23).

Hygiene during scheduled face to face instruction and counseling for Phase 4:

WEOC schools will provide adequate supplies to support healthy hygiene behaviors (including soap, hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol for safe use by staff and students, paper towels, tissues, and signs reinforcing proper handwashing techniques). Staff will teach and reinforce handwashing with soap and water for at least 20 seconds and/or the safe use of hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Supply sharing will be discouraged or very limited. Personal items will be kept seperate.

3. Cleaning

Please describe how you will implement the cleaning **requirements** for cleaning protocols from the *Return to School Roadmap* (p. 27).

<u>Cleaning during scheduled face to face instruction and counseling for Phase 4:</u> WEOC schools will provide adequate supplies for cleaning. Frequently touched surfaces including light switches, doors, benches, bathrooms, will undergo cleaning at least every four hours with either an EPA-approved disinfectant or diluted bleach solution. Libraries, computer labs, arts, and other hands-on classrooms will undergo cleaning after every class period with either an EPA-approved disinfectant or diluted bleach solution. Student desks will be wiped down with either an EPA-approved disinfectant or diluted bleach solution after every class period. WEOC will ensure safe and correct use and storage of cleaning and disinfection products, including storing products securely away from children, and with adequate ventilation when staff use products. Staff will wear gloves, surgical masks, and face shields when performing all cleaning activities. Additional temporary cleaning staff may be hired to accommodate the additional work of cleaning regularly.

4. Athletics

Please describe how you will implement the **requirements** for athletics protocols from the *Return to School Roadmap* (p. 27).

WEOC does not offer student athletics. Students access athletic programs through their local educational authority and will fall under each district plan for this purpose.

5. Screening

Please describe how you will implement the **requirements** for screening protocols from the *Return to School Roadmap* (p. 24).

WEOC will fully cooperate with the local public health department regarding implementing protocols for

screening students and staff. WEOC schools will identify and designate a quarantine area and a staff person to care for students who become ill at school. Students who become ill with symptoms of COVID-19 will be placed in an identified quarantine area with a surgical mask until they can go home using their mode of transportation to school or be picked up by an adult. School staff caring for these children will wear a surgical mask, with the exception of students with special needs requiring aerosolized procedures in which an N95 mask is required. Symptomatic students sent home from school will be told to stay home until they have tested negative or have completely recovered according to CDC guidelines.

Staff will conduct daily self-examinations, including a temperature check, prior to coming to work. If they exhibit any respiratory or gastrointestinal symptoms, or have a temperature of 100.4 or greater, they will stay home.

Families will be encouraged to check their child's temperature at home every morning using oral, tympanic, or temporal scanners; students with a temperature of 100.4 or greater will be expected to stay home and consider coronavirus testing if symptoms of COVID-19 are present. These absences will not be penalized. Families will be encouraged to monitor their children for symptoms of COVID-19. The presence of any symptoms, including cough or shortness of breath, should prompt the family to keep the student home from school and to follow up with a primary care provider.

6. Testing

Please describe how you will implement the **requirements** for testing protocols from the *Return to School Roadmap* (p. 25).

WEOC will fully cooperate with the local public health department regarding implementing protocols for screening students and staff. Symptomatic students and staff sent home from school will be told to stay home until they have tested negative for COVID-19, or have been released from isolation according to CDC guidelines. Families will be notified of the presence of any laboratory positive or clinically diagnosed cases of COVID-19 in the school to encourage closer observation for any symptoms at home. In the event of a lab or clinically diagnosed case of COVID-19, WEOC will corporate with the health department to make immediate efforts to contact any close contacts (those who spent more than 15 minutes less than six feet in close proximity to the student or staff member) so that they can be quarantined for 14 days at home. Students and staff should be closely monitored for any symptoms of COVID-19. At this time, only those that develop symptoms of COVID-19 require testing for COVID-19.

7. Busing and Student Transportation

WEOC does not offer student transportation. Students take individual or public transport to WAVE and ECA. Some WIHI/WIMA students access transportation through some participating local educational authorities and will fall under the Ypsilanti Community Schools district plan for this purpose.

WEOC will offer staggered scheduling for school classes during Phase 5. All strongly recommended items, including safety, spacing and distancing, and cleaning procedures will be followed by WEOC programs while Michigan is in Phase 5.

For remote education, WEOC will ensure:

All modes of successful community at WEOC are founded on strong relationships with students and families. In Phase 5, there will be a return to face to face scheduled instruction for all WEOC programs. Schedules may look different than in Phase 6. The modes of instruction below will continue in order to enable continuation of our deep commitment to our families and students to support individualized needs for all. Increasing the reach of instruction will use both face to face and remote teacher communication and multiple learning options provided via Google Classroom, PowerSchool Learning, Canvas, Telephone communication, Video Chat, Project-Based Learning, and instructional course packs and other printed materials.

WEOC programs will also continue to use partnerships with EMU and WCC for dual enrollment and early college access to college classes for students enrolled in college courses. Communications and virtual instruction will include email, telephone communication both voice and text, as well as the online instructional resources already mentioned.

Counseling and social emotional support for Phase 5:

As we transition to more face to face interactions the counseling department will be focused on helping reintegrate students into the physical school space, while being cognizant of the very reasonable fears and concerns around health and safety many will experience. We will continue to be available in person and/or virtually and will maintain existing efforts to communicate with students and families outside of our school building. However, we will also offer more of our traditional face to face offerings, including one on one meetings and small group instruction. We will aim to make these supports as accessible as possible and hope to be able to help bring a sense of normalcy and consistency to otherwise hard to predict times.
